MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

2020 was a difficult year for everyone and especially so for the performing arts.

On behalf of the Board of Directors, I want to acknowledge the superb job that our staff did in responding to the unique challenges presented by a global pandemic. Led by our General Manager, Bruce Halliday, the core team adapted with ingenuity and perseverance. We proudly served the people of the Nanaimo region under very trying circumstances.

The Society has always been creative, healthy, and stable. Since our opening in 1998, we've been steadily growing. In 2019, we hosted over 300 events and welcomed more than 121,000 patrons and participants. We assumed we would continue to grow, as Nanaimo is such a vibrant community with an expanding talent pool.

None of us predicted the pandemic. When it hit in March, our theatre was one of the first places to shut down in Nanaimo. Staff transitioned to working from home as we continued to learn about the virus and how to keep everyone healthy and safe. The mindset at the time was, "this is temporary." Events were cancelled or postponed for the near-future. However, as the pandemic continued on, it became clear we weren't going to return to "normal" anytime soon.

In the fall, we launched our Spotlight series with renewed hope. The Port Theatre was allowed to open to 50 in-theatre patrons as long as we followed COVID-19 protocols. We invested in safety equipment and implemented new health standards to ensure that our patrons, volunteers, staff, and artists were protected. It went well. We also launched our livestream technology, so patrons could enjoy from the comfort of home.

Sadly, COVID-19 cases continued to rise in our province and throughout the world. As a result, Dr. Bonnie Henry made the decision in November to increase restrictions and suspend in-person gatherings. The Port Theatre shut down once again. Spotlight shows were postponed until 2021.

It's been a difficult year. However, we haven't stopped learning, growing, and evolving. As we adapt to our new world, we look forward with hope and a renewed commitment to our mandate. We are here

to provide opportunities for citizens to experience live performance. Livestreaming is not the same, but it's the next best thing to being at the theatre in-person.

The Port Theatre Society has weathered the first year of the pandemic and remains strong and viable. There will be more challenges ahead as life slowly returns to normal. I'm confident that the staff and board of the Society are prepared to meet these challenges.

I'm proud to be part of this amazing arts organization and community. Thank you for your continued support and commitment to the Port Theatre!

GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT

2020 began like any other year. Then, as we know, along came March. On March 17th, we received the public health order to shutter and cease all gatherings. The ensuing months brought many new orders amid an ever-changing landscape. With an abundance of caution, we immediately set up systems so full-time staff could work from home. I implemented daily staff video meetings with the management team so we could respond to the crisis and prepare for the uncharted journey that lay ahead. The learning curve was steep, but we were up and running in a very short time.

Given the uncertainties, we focused on our core values: leadership, accountability, and integrity. Most importantly, we set out to learn quickly by putting the safety of our patrons, artists, volunteers, and staff first. We looked towards the future by setting a course on how the Port Theatre would continue to build and maintain trust in our community. With over 250 events on our books from March through to December, we began to cancel or postpone shows. We undertook the process of continually leapfrogging bookings in the hope of returning to full occupancy. We refunded tickets to all patrons who requested, while also offering patrons the opportunity to hold onto tickets for postponed events. We developed comprehensive COVID-19 safety protocols, shifting as health orders shifted. We prepared for in-person concerts with 50 patrons physically distanced and worked to develop new and inventive ways to stay engaged with our clients and our audience.

We had many projects in varying stages of development that had to be postponed, planned, and re-planned, many of which did not materialize, but we were not deterred. Determined to put our creativity to work, we applied for and received funding to assist in the purchase of excellent livestreaming equipment. We adapted our ticketing system to accommodate physical distancing and sell livestream tickets. We put a touchless ticket-scanning system in place. We installed touchless bathroom fixtures.

There have been many challenges, the most difficult being seeing our part-time and casual staff laid off with no work in sight. As diligently as we worked to assist each and every one, it was a deep blow to see our family divided. With the Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy program (CEWS), we were fortunate to maintain all but two full-time staff throughout the year. This core team is vital to our ability to return to a high level of activity. Thanks to this team of staff and our Board of Directors, we remained strong and unified under the pressures, taking on a leadership role in setting extremely high standards of operations under these challenging circumstances. We have set equally high standards for our livestreaming and are constantly developing new ways to enhance audience experience.

We have tirelessly worked to prepare for re-opening. We will, once again, be the safe, welcoming gathering place our community deserves. Almost from the onset of COVID-19, I have focused on how we, the Port Theatre, could best react to this world crisis through our actions and our approach. I am keenly aware of the trust that has been built between the theatre and our audiences over the years. We greatly value our funders, our clients, our artists, and most importantly, the community we serve.

We developed a condensed mission statement over the years: "Showing Leadership... Building Community." Never has it seemed so relevant. 2020 challenged us, yet we survived. 2020 has changed us all. We are committed to learning, adapting, and remaining a values-based organization, remaining relevant in this new world. 2020 challenged us to look inward, embracing the unknown. As good stewards of this community asset, we want to assure you that every step towards recovery that has been taken, and will be taken, has one purpose... to best serve you, our community. We will assuredly return to live events, and together we will once again create new memories, exploring the world of artists and audiences and sharing that warm sense of community that is live performance.

Due to COVID-19, The Port Theatre Society stopped collecting donations for our Theatre Angels program as in-person shows were cancelled. As soon as we return to full capacity, we look forward to offering this program once again so all members of our community can enjoy live performance.

FACILITY UPDATE

2020 was a year that tested the resolve and resiliency of the technical and support staff of the Port Theatre. While we were able to maintain our core staff of five technicians through to the end of the year, we bade farewell to Liam Worthington, Head of Audio, in December. Our former Head of Audio, Wilson Pascoe, is currently reprising that role, returning to the position after two years of advancing shows in the office.

After the initial shock of the shutdown wore off, the theatre started to work on plans within the facility to operate under the new normal of COVID-19. As audiences were allowed until the beginning of November, some critical improvements were made for audience safety including touchless fixtures in the public washrooms and the purchase of ticket scanners to eliminate the need for ushers to touch patrons' paper tickets. Tickets can also now be printed at home, saving patrons time and decreasing physical contact. These improvements were part of a comprehensive safety plan that was developed to ensure comfort for patrons, artists, volunteers, and staff alike.

The biggest innovation on the stage side was the purchase of a streaming video system. In May, the theatre put in an order for four cameras and a switcher with the intent to do a live, multi-camera broadcast to anyone who did not feel comfortable or simply couldn't attend in person. The learning curve was steep with technology and practices that were new to us. Between the combined efforts of the technical and the ticket centre staff, we are able to shoot, edit, stream, and sell tickets to events live on our stage that look and sound fantastic and are the next best thing to being there. The learning continues now as we discover new uses and adaptations for it and look for ways to support our clientele.

Of these improvements, the video system and ticket scanners were purchased with assistance from the Department of Canadian Heritage Cultural Spaces Fund. The washroom upgrades were accomplished with funding from the City of Nanaimo.

Since the pandemic began, we have been developing and maintaining a safety plan intended to prevent the transmission of COVID-19 at the theatre. We created this plan with guidance from WorkSafe BC as well as ActSafe (an advisory body that supports BC's arts and entertainment industries in the areas of health and safety). The plan will continue to be updated as new information becomes available and the restrictions put in place by Public Health change. The goal of this safety plan is to provide a safe and functional environment for our staff, performers, and audience members so we can continue to deliver the professional quality productions our community has come to expect from The Port Theatre. As in all areas of our operation, our mission remains, "showing leadership... building community."

VOLUNTEERS

2020 was a year of endurance for our volunteer program as the Port Theatre grappled with a global pandemic that greatly impacted our community and the world. In January, we started the year with 154 active volunteers. In September, 54 volunteers were able to attend our annual volunteer forum where they were updated and trained on new safety COVID-19 protocols and procedures. It was a time for reflection as some volunteers were unable to return due to risks associated with the pandemic.

With the help of our volunteers, we re-opened the theatre in October and November to in-theatre audiences of 50 people who were physically distanced and wearing masks. Some volunteers took on the role of greeting patrons at our entry doors and completing audience health questionnaires. Others were trained in using our new ticket scanners, devices that helped create a touchless seating procedure. All of our volunteers were given Port Theatre masks upon their return. Safety remained the top priority as we moved ahead with a variety of fall events.

At the end of November, the Port Theatre had to once again close its doors to the public and say farewell to our volunteers. We are very proud of the commitment of all of our volunteers and their collective willingness to adapt to these changing times. These efforts are part of a longstanding Port Theatre tradition of updating skills to better serve our patrons. We look forward to opening our doors for live performances sometime in the very near future. It will be a pleasure to see everyone again, and we hope that everyone continues to remain healthy and safe.



2020 started off extremely strong with Unikkaaqtuat, a multidisciplinary production led by Artcirq, Les 7 Doigts de la main and Taqqut Productions. This unprecedented creation celebrated Inuit culture, its traditions and vision for the future. In an atmosphere shaped by video projections and a world of shadows, actors, live musicians, and acrobats transported the audience to an ancient world when life had not known death, days had not seen light, and where Inuit had not met white people.

In the lobby, before Unikkaaqtuat, we hosted a pre-show celebration including Elder Geraldine Manson, Foot Prints of the Wolf, and Patrick Aleck (Xwaluputhut). Drumming, storytelling, and First Nations food brought everyone in the community together. Snuneymuxw elders attended as well as students who identified as Inuit in School District 68. A total of 746 people from our community attended the production, which was a massive success!

Despite COVID-19, The Port Theatre Society entertained audiences throughout the year from hilarious world-famous male ballet dancers in Les Ballets Trockadero de Monte Carlo to an enchanting mother-son performance with Joëlle Rabu & Nico Rhodes. Artists, funders, sponsors, and audience members carried us through this strange and challenging season. In addition, patrons are now enjoying livestreaming safely from home.


